
The Summer I Turned Pretty by Jenny Han


They Both Die at the End by Adam Silvera


My Heart & Other Breakables by Alex Barclay




Heartstopper Volume 1 by Alice Oseman

The Asparagus Bunch by Jessica Scott-Whyte



Unraveller by Frances Hardinge


